For over eight years, Mara has been a passionate advocate at the helm of Volunteering Queensland, navigating through significant transformation and change. Her substantial impact included the transition to a strong, positive fiscal position and multiple strategic, operational, and technological advancements.

Previously the CEO of Volunteering Western Australia, Mara has made her mark nationally across the sector.

Mara successfully rebranded and repositioned Volunteering Queensland to advance its role as a respected peak body for volunteering. She has worked to unite Queensland's volunteering sector and build volunteering through good volunteer management practice. Mara has been pivotal in implementing many innovative programs promoting equity and inclusion as well as sector and broader community capacity and capability building.

Notably, Mara led Volunteering Queensland's Emergency Volunteering CREW and Care Army response through the management of numerous devastating disasters and the COVID-19 pandemic. A focus of her leadership has been the reinvigoration and valuing of volunteering at a time of challenge and decline in volunteer participation rates. Her leadership has positioned Volunteering Queensland as a dynamic and innovative organisation. She leaves a huge legacy and will be greatly missed. 

Thank you to our volunteers, members, partners, staff and supporters for your continued dedication to VQ.










On May 16, 2024, the Brisbane City Council partnered with Volunteering Queensland to orchestrate the 29th Brisbane Homeless Connect event. It was a motivating event and despite the not so favourable weather conditions, 872 vulnerable community members were connected to essential services, through a joyful day filled with support, food, entertainment, and genuine social inclusion.

- 872 participants assisted by 298 volunteers.





Road Ahead

Release of Qld State Volunteering Strategy

The Queensland Government consulted with Volunteering Queensland and the wider volunteering sector to inform the development of their Queensland Volunteering Strategy (the Strategy), a key action in their Communities 2032 Action Plan 2022–2025. The Strategy will direct the Queensland Government's efforts to elevate volunteering in Queensland. The core focus areas of the Strategy are to ensure volunteering is supported and sustainable, vibrant and inclusive, and properly recognised and celebrated. These focus areas are reinforced by a twenty-nine point Action Plan, with the key government agency identified for progressing each action with the support of the volunteering ecosystem. The Strategy and related Action Plan will be released in September 2024.

Election Year / Advocacy Strategy

Volunteering Queensland Advocacy Plan

As part of finalizing our 2024 State of Volunteering Report, Volunteering Queensland produced an Advocacy Plan to guide our ongoing work in the short and medium term. This builds on work already done by VQ and the wider volunteering ecosystem. We will continue to liaise with Volunteer Involving Organisations and with volunteers themselves about how best to progress these actions, including more effectively communicating these to policy and decision makers. VQ will also continue to engage with all representatives and political parties in the newly elected state Parliament, including advocating on key proposals such as those we put forward in our pre-Budget and pre-election submissions. These include providing more resources and training foe Queenslanders who volunteer and local organisations who assist them, ongoing investment in volunteering in emergency and disaster situations, stronger insurance protections for volunteers and resourcing of future research into volunteering in our state.
