





Your generosity, dedication and hard work are the backbone of everything we do.



Volunteering Queensland acknowledges the Traditional Custodians of land, sea and community throughout Australia and pay respect to First Nations Elders past and present. We recognise that community giving has been taking place in First Nations communities for tens of thousands of years and celebrate the contributions of the first volunteers. We support the power of volunteering and community giving to foster reconciliation.

#### A stronger voice for volunteering

This year has been one of transformative change, progress, resilience, and impact for Volunteering Queensland (VQ). We have made significant internal changes to processes and staffing, shifted our focus to deepen our community development work and increase our impact, and implemented a new ICT roadmap to underpin our next 10 years. We have been more active in the community and strengthened the voice, visibility, and value of volunteering, ensuring that Queensland's volunteers and Volunteer Involving Organisations are recognised, supported, and empowered.

A defining milestone of the year was the appointment of the Honourable Ann Leahy MP as Queensland's first dedicated Minister for Volunteering. This historic step reflects the critical role volunteers play in our communities and provides an unprecedented platform for reform and growth. The Minister has long been a strong advocate for volunteering, and her appointment is a huge step forward for the sector. VQ contributed a comprehensive submission to the Parliamentary Inquiry into Volunteering and supported every public hearing - leading sector conversations on removing barriers and enabling more Queenslanders to participate in meaningful volunteer roles.

### Volunteers at the heart of disaster response

Our work in emergency volunteering again proved vital. VQ contributed at a State and local level through the various groups under the emergency management arrangements, and provided ongoing support and advice to communities and organisations across Queensland. Through EV CREW, we mobilised and connected volunteers to support communities affected by severe weather events, including Cyclone Alfred. These efforts reinforced the unique and irreplaceable role that spontaneous volunteers can play in disaster response, recovery, and resilience.

# **Celebrating 10 years of recognition**

This year marked the 10th anniversary of the Queensland Volunteering Awards. This continues to be such an impactful and moving event. More than 300 guests gathered at Brisbane City Hall to celebrate, with new categories introduced to capture the breadth of contributions across our state. Our biennial

Queensland Volunteering Conference was another highlight, bringing together leaders and changemakers under the theme Inspire. Empower. Ignite, to share ideas, innovation, and best practice. We recognise the enormous contribution our Volunteer Managers make and this was an opportunity to thank them for their valuable work.

#### Building stronger organisations and future leaders

We launched the Volunteer Involving Organisation (VIO) Register, creating a statewide platform to identify and connect VIOs to strengthen organisations, amplify their voice, and ensure their needs are at the centre of policy and practice. The VIO Register will provide valuable data on the sector and allow us to map volunteer vacancy rates and trends in real time. Our Youth Volunteering and Registered Training Organisation (RTO) programs continued to grow, engaging more than 1,000 students in accredited volunteering qualifications. This investment in young people builds the future of volunteering and ensures strong leadership and innovation for the years ahead.

## Driving change through advocacy and partnerships

VQ's advocacy extended across the sector through our partnerships and collaborations. We championed the findings of the State of Volunteering in Queensland 2024, which provides an evidence base to drive reform, and partnered with QCOSS and other peak bodies to lead a very successful pre-election campaign for a stronger community sector. As our new State Government settled in, we had great conversations with new Ministers and DGs to highlight volunteering contribution

across departments and communities.

We collaborated across the sector – with stakeholders old and new – to support the Parliamentary Inquiry into Volunteering. We acknowledge and thank the Queensland Government Department of Local Government, Water and Volunteers for their genuine and inclusive collaboration – particularly the new Volunteer Policy and Engagement Unit. We also acknowledge our continuing collaboration with the federal Department of Social Services, and their strong engagement with, and advocacy for, VQ and the sector.

#### The road ahead

As we look ahead, VQ remains committed to building a state where everyone can contribute, participate, and thrive through volunteering. With momentum for reform and strong sector collaboration, 2025-26 promises to be a year of opportunity and continued impact. For over 42 years our funding has depended on the kindness of governments, and the cyclical nature of project funding meant we have never had the resources to lay down strong systems and foundations. We know these are needed if volunteering is to survive and thrive.

We want to recognise the great work of our partner Volunteer Resource Centre organisations who have been developing new business models as they deliver Volunteer Management Activity (VMA) services with us. VQ has also looked to shift and strengthen our income streams. This year we received

approximately \$4m into the business — \$3m of this through federal and state government contracts, grants and service agreements. Around \$2m of this went directly back out to Queensland community organisations through direct grants and project funding. The rest supported the advocacy, education, training and community development projects that VQ undertakes. As the costs and compliance burden of business continue to rise, we have begun to build more productive financial partnerships to support the resources we need for the future.

It has indeed been a mammoth year and none of this would have been possible without the tireless support of our members, partners, volunteers, staff, and Board. Together, we will continue to elevate volunteering as a powerful force for inclusion, connection, and resilience in Oueensland.

# Advocacy & POLICY

In Financial Year 24/25, Volunteering Queensland strengthened the policy voice of volunteers and achieved major milestones in government recognition and reform.



- **Minister for Volunteering:** Secured Queensland's first dedicated Ministerial portfolio and government unit for volunteer policy and engagement.
- Parliamentary Inquiry into Volunteering: Supported and promoted the first state inquiry, generating 560+ SUBMISSIONS and 15 HEARINGS statewide; VQ lodged a detailed submission and mobilised sector input.
- State election priorities: Released 2024 priorities to influence election commitments and future policy
- Thought leadership: Published Five Forces Changing Volunteering in Queensland, highlighting emerging challenges and opportunities.
- Policy submissions: Contributed to multiple inquiries and reviews, including:
  - Parliamentary Inquiry into Elder Abuse
  - Queensland Government's Sports Strategy
  - Queensland Government's Tourism Strategy
  - Inspector-General of Emergency Management reviews into 2025 severe weather events
- Advocacy campaigns: Backed wider initiatives such as the QCOSS cost-of-living reforms, ensuring volunteer perspectives were included in broader policy debates.
- Sector Support: Over the year our CEO and Policy Advisor undertook over 140
   ENGAGEMENTS with stakeholders across the sector, as well as attending regular sector meetings and working groups.

Through activities like fire-building, outdoor cooking, community service, and leadership planning, Annette helps young women build confidence in a space she describes as "a really fun, safe place for girls of all types," offering both practical skills and emotional growth.





### Bronwyn Sheehan and Liz Calligeros THE PYJAMA FOUNDATION


Founded in 2004 by former nurse and mother of three Bronwyn Sheehan, The Pyjama Foundation began after she met a foster carer whose child was being left out at school. Today, volunteers known as "Pyjama Angels" visit children in care each week, offering learning support and stability. Liz Calligeros, who has volunteered and coordinated fundraising for six years, says, "When you hear stories from volunteers ... it's almost impossible not to want to help." Bronwyn adds, "For many of our volunteers, it's the highlight of their week because they get so much from the experience."

### Ric and Paul COMMUNIFY

Ric and Paul are volunteer drivers with Communify, helping people travel around Brisbane. The pair met at a polling booth where Paul, known as the "dog park recruiter" for his knack of signing up volunteers, convinced Ric to join. Both say driving is rewarding for the connections it brings, with Ric noting, "You get to chat to and help a lot of different people," and Paul adding, "Volunteering gives me routine, confidence, and something to show up for." They agree the key to good volunteering is feeling valued and supported, something Communify delivers in spades.

# **VOLUNTEER INVOLVING ORGANISATION (VIO) REGISTER**




In May 2025, VQ in partnership with My Community Directory, and funded under the Department of Social Services Volunteer Management Activity program, launched the Queensland **VIO Register**, a major step in building a connected and supported volunteering ecosystem across Queensland. The register provides real-time data on sector needs and enables more targeted communication, capacity-building, and advocacy.

#### Through the VIO Register we can:

- Strengthen communication and capacity across the volunteering sector.
- · Access real-time insights into issues, opportunities, and barriers.
- · Direct support and advocacy where it's needed most.

### **ACCREDITED TRAINING**

Volunteering Queensland operates a Registered Training Organisation (RTO #6020) that delivers nationally accredited qualifications and professional development programs tailored to meet the evolving needs of the volunteering sector.

In exciting news for the upcoming year the RTO will have a name - The Australian College of Volunteering, to reflect the national breadth of our qualifications and students.

# Community Impact CORPORATE VOLUNTEERING

Volunteering Queensland's Community Impact Program (CIP) creates meaningful connections between volunteer-involving organisations and teams eager to make a difference. This financial year marked significant milestones, including the signing of three-year partnerships with both BHP BMA and Rio Tinto, a three-stage pilot with People First Bank and several one-off Community Impact Days in collaboration with local businesses and organisations.

The CIP team works closely with everyone involved to design team-based volunteering opportunities that deliver hands-on help exactly where it is needed, creating a real and lasting impact at the grassroots level of local communities.

In 2024-2025, the program engaged over 480 VOLUNTEERS, delivering an estimated \$110,286 IN VALUE TO THE QUEENSLAND COMMUNITY.

This is more than just volunteering, it is strategic community building through the creation of meaningful partnerships.



## Rio Tinto Community Impact Day RONALD MCDONALD HOUSE

Parents of seriously ill children often don't have the time or energy to cook after long days at the hospital.

On Community Impact Day, the Rio Tinto team tied on aprons and filled the kitchen with the smell of fresh baking, preparing hot meals and comforting treats for families. In just one day, they served 270 MEALS, contributing 28 VOLUNTEER HOURS and over \$1,300 in community value.





### BHP/BMA Community Impact Day SAVE OUR WATERWAYS NOW (SOWN)

SOWN works to restore creek habitats across Brisbane's west, and on Impact Day the BHP/BMA team rolled up their sleeves at the Bob Wilson Habitat.

Despite tough weather, they pulled invasive weeds and planted more than 50 new natives to strengthen the bush care site. Together they contributed 60 VOLUNTEER HOURS, planting 120 NATIVE PLANTS and generating almost \$2,900 in community value.

### People First Bank Community Impact Day GREEN CORNER PROJECT

At Communify's Green Corner community garden, people come together to grow food, share skills, and build friendships.

On Impact Day, the People First Bank team brought fresh energy to the space, working alongside volunteers to nurture the garden and strengthen its role as an inner-city gathering place. Their efforts added 35 VOLUNTEER HOURS, valued at over \$1,600, plus a DIRECT \$500 DONATION to support Communify's work.



#### **SENIORS VOLUNTEERING**



The Seniors Volunteering Project is a Queensland pilot aiming to increase volunteering among older Queenslanders (65+), funded by the Queensland Government. Launched in October 2024, it combines state-wide initiatives with local pilots in FRASER COAST and MARANDA, providing accessible volunteering opportunities, resources, and support through older Volunteer Ambassadors.

#### **KEY ACTIVITIES**

- Developed resources encouraging older people to volunteer and supporting VIOs in engaging them.
- Implemented a communications strategy and state-wide Volunteer Ambassador program for online/phone support.
- Built local pathways and connections in pilot areas, mapping volunteering infrastructure and engaging older people as community leaders.

#### VIO Consultation MARYBOROUGH PROGRESS ASSOCIATION

A recent consultation highlighted the value of hands-on support from the Community Project Officer, who used Canva and AI tools to develop position descriptions, social media tiles, and promotional content, saving the group time and effort.

Practical tips for volunteer recruitment were also shared, helping strengthen capacity and impact. More sessions were planned on the Fraser Coast with services that support socially isolated community members and rely on volunteers





### Get into Volunteering OUEENSLAND SENIORS PROJECT

The 'Get into Volunteering' sessions empower older Queenslanders to explore volunteering with confidence, offering practical guidance, resources, and connection.

Seniors' report feeling "more confident and motivated" to get involved, while Volunteer Ambassadors, local seniors providing peer support, add extra encouragement.

By helping older adults take the first step, the program is strengthening networks, wellbeing, and community inclusion.

#### Volunteer Ambassadors QUEENSLAND SENIORS PROJECT

As a Volunteer Ambassador in the Seniors Project, Sally has found renewed purpose and connection through engaging with other older Australians. She shares her experiences, offers support, and helps build community, while also benefiting herself.

"Volunteering keeps me active, socially connected, and mentally engaged," she says, proof of the program's value for both seniors receiving support and those giving it.

# Strong and Resilient Communities Activity **SMALL GRANTS PROGRAM**

Funded by the Australian Government Department of Social Services, this program provided oneoff grants of \$10,000-\$20,000 to grassroots organisations to strengthen volunteer management and support the participation of vulnerable and disadvantaged people. In FY25, 29 organisations were successfully funded from a total of 83 applications.

# Volunteer Management Activity (VMA) PROGRAM

Volunteering Queensland delivers projects and funding across Queensland under the VMA program on behalf of the Australian Government's Department of Social Services, supporting initiatives that expand volunteering opportunities and strengthen community participation across the state.

As part of our work under this grant we oversee small funding grants to Volunteering Gold Coast, Volunteering North Queensland, Far North Queensland Volunteers, and Volunteering Sunshine Coast. We partner with them on the delivery of VMA activities to improve volunteering opportunities for the priority groups, and develop and implement online resources to support increased volunteering. As well as the VMA work we do within our team, and the projects we run in collaboration with partners, we deliver community grants to fund volunteer capability growth across the state.

### Angels of Opportunity FARM ANGELS

Farm Angels' Angels of Opportunity initiative in Chinchilla strengthened volunteer participation and employment readiness for underrepresented groups through training, mentoring, and tailored support.

The program fostered an inclusive environment where volunteers built skills, confidence, and social connections. In this period, 18 VOLUNTEERS contributed 747 HOURS, with two gaining employment, demonstrating the program's impact on both individuals and the community.





### Re-Open the Doors of History ST GEORGE TOURISM MUSEUM

The St George Tourism Museum Association boosted rural volunteer engagement by embedding cultural safety and inclusivity.

A Regional Volunteer Expo drew 120 ATTENDEES, new resources improved onboarding, and cultural competency training with local Elders welcomed 22 NEW VOLUNTEERS, including three First Nations participants. Stronger partnerships and inclusive practices created a sustainable model for remote communities.

### Art Post Volunteering THE GENUS INC

The Genus Inc's Art Post initiative boosted inclusive volunteering through tailored workshops, a six-week peer mentoring program, and new handbooks that improved onboarding, clarified roles, and embedded cultural safety. Cultural awareness training strengthened respectful engagement with First Nations communities, while reinforced governance and leadership practices built volunteer confidence and collaboration. The project positions The Genus Inc as a leader in trauma-informed, culturally responsive volunteering, offering a scalable model for regional and remote Queensland.




# National Student Volunteer Week 5 - 11 AUGUST 2024

### Queensland Volunteer of the Year Award

KIMBERLY DOYLE has driven inclusion and growth in Special Olympics Mackay, Fire, and Queensland since 2014, expanding sports programs, securing over \$10,000 in sponsorships, and advocating for athletes' access. Her initiatives, from virtual Kung Fu sessions to international performances, have strengthened participation, awareness, and community engagement.



#### Queensland Lifetime Contribution to Volunteering Award



NOEL SHERRINGTON has dedicated 40+ years and 14,000+ volunteer hours to St John Ambulance Qld, serving in leadership, training, and operational roles. He played a pivotal role during the 2011 Queensland floods and was instrumental in reforming Health and Medical Services in 2022. Noel's commitment has strengthened volunteer capacity and embodied St John's values of humanity, compassion, and excellence.

PETER MORLEY has dedicated over 30 years to service through ShelterBox Australia, Rotary, Meals on Wheels, and Bendigo Bank. He has raised more than \$250,000 for global disaster relief, led award-winning community projects, and championed vital local services, leaving a lasting impact in Queensland and beyond.



### **Queensland Youth Volunteer of the Year Award**

RHEANCA LINCOLN is co-founder and copresident of We Are Not Alone (WRNA), a youth-led initiative championing social connection and leadership for young people with disabilities in regional Australia. Since 2023, she has led inclusive events, workshops, and panels, partnering with multiple organisations and securing key grants, to empower and amplify youth voices.



Cindel Richardson began with SES at 12 as a Cadet and joined Yeppoon SES at 16. Over two decades, she's led responses to Cyclones Larry, Yasi, Marcia, and the 2022 Brisbane floods. Beyond frontline work, she mentors volunteers, raised \$60,000 for Yeppoon SES, and revitalised training in the Cleveland Group.

As Acting Inspector with Queensland Police and mother of three, she still dedicates hundreds of hours annually to SES operations, coordinating search and rescue, innovating training, and strengthening recruitment—building capability, culture, and community connection with integrity and empathy.



### **Queensland New Volunteer Award**

MEHVISH MUKADDAM arrived in Brisbane from India in 2024 and quickly made an impact through diverse volunteering. At Volunteering Queensland and the Queensland Conservation Council, she supported teams, events, and campaigns with initiative, resilience, and curiosity; connecting communities, promoting volunteering, and serving as an inspiring role model for newly arrived migrants.


